

Bike show in Oswestry sees over 1,000 gather for event

More than 1,000 biking enthusiasts gathered for a popular custom motorcycle show.

The second annual Creaser's Custom Bike Show took place on July 26 in [Oswestry](#), hosted by custom bike builder Steven Creaser of Creaser's Motorcycles and Customs, in partnership with The Carriages Oswestry.

Launched in 2025, the event aims to unite the biking community while giving businesses a platform to display their services and craftsmanship.

Steven Creaser said: "It was brilliant to see so many bikers come together again and support the show.

"There were some incredible bikes on display, and the quality of the custom work was outstanding.

"Events like this are important for keeping the biking community connected and giving businesses the chance to show what they can do.

"I'm grateful to everyone who attended and helped make the second year such a success."

Bikers showcased custom-built, modified and standard motorcycles while connecting with fellow enthusiasts.

Visitors travelled from as far as Wolverhampton, Stoke-on-Trent and Liverpool, bringing new attention to Oswestry and its surrounding areas.

The event featured a diverse range of businesses and organisations, including Lee Morgan Artwork, Dynojet, Harley-Davidson Manchester, Mental Health Motorbike and the Midlands Air Ambulance Charity.

Creaser's Motorcycles and Customs, along with Harley Owners Group, Bretton Motorcycles and ArtByMe Designs, also took part.

Live entertainment came from Shropshire rock trio Watermelon Chronicles, who played a mix of original songs and classic covers.

Visitors could also try axe throwing courtesy of Tristan.

Food and drink were provided by The Carriages Oswestry and Cambrian Antiques.

The show was organised by Mr Creaser, Brontë Madison and Ashley Kitchen of The Carriages Oswestry.

The trio started the event in response to the decline of other motorcycle gatherings.

After a strong launch last year, with more than 1,000 attendees, the 2026 edition saw further growth.

Organisers now hope to establish the show as a permanent fixture.

Brontë Madison said: "We would like to thank everyone who attended, exhibited or helped make the day possible.

"Despite the unpredictable weather, the support was incredible, and it was brilliant to see so many people come together to celebrate the biking community.

"We're already looking forward to seeing what 2027 could bring."

The organisers said the continued growth of the event shows the importance of keeping the custom biking scene alive.
